Not only is December holiday season, it is also report card season. First term Progress Reports will be coming home in December. Conversations continue around the use of the Proficiency Scale and the shift in thinking it requires. As we go deeper with learning and use multiple ways to represent and assess that learning, it is more exciting and engaging for all learners. However, it is not possible to neatly wrap up learning periods like in the past where lessons were delivered, worksheets were completed and then were followed by an end of unit written test and all of these were done according to schedule. The progress reports that will go home in December will reflect a variety of learning at many different stages. Student' progress will be commented on based on that. For example, in first term Division 13 did a huge inquiry into the Life Cycle of Spiders while Division 15 deeply explored foxes in their Science Inquiry on how living things survive. Based on the students' interest and ongoing engagement in both Science Big Ideas, there would be no way to cut the learning short to provide a specific 'mark.' Instead, the teachers will provide comments based on their assessment of the learning that has been happening to date. The descriptive feedback, the proficiency scale descriptor, along with the work your learners have brought home will help to create a picture of what your student knows, can do, and understands at the end of first term. Please let me know if you would like to discuss this further.
